



BLEEDING


It is normal to have some light bleeding intermittently in the urine after a urological procedure. It usually causes red or brown discolouration of the urine, and is darker in the mornings.

Procedure	Severity	Duration
Cystoscopy Urodynamic studies Botulinum toxin injection	Light	1-3 days
Bladder biopsy or resection Laser or stone surgery Prostate biopsy or seed insertion Prostate steam ablation (Rezum)	Light to moderate	1-5 days
Insertion of stent	Light	Weeks to months
Prostate resection (TURP) Prostate green light surgery	Moderate to heavy	1-6 weeks

Pee into a transparent jar or container and look at the colour and consistency:

- Fresh and persistent bleeding makes the urine look bright red, like cordial
- Old blood looks deep red or brownish, like Coke or red wine
- With light or minor bleeding, you can see through the container and urine looks watery and clear
- With heavy bleeding, you cannot see through the container and the urine looks thick and viscous, with stringy lumps or clots - contact Dr Ooi or go to the Emergency Department

If the colour is light, it is usually caused by minor capillary bleeding that will settle down. These measures will help:

- 1. Drink more fluids to flush the blood through and prevent clots from forming
- 2. Rest and take it easy avoid strenuous activities which may worsen the bleeding
- 3. Do not lift anything heavy or strain on stools this increases pelvic pressure which may worsen the bleeding
- 4. If you are on blood thinning medication, please consult with Dr Ooi to see if you can stop it for a few days

If the colour is thick and no longer translucent in a clear container, or if there are clots, please collect some urine or take a photo and do one of the following:

- 1. Call an ambulance or go to the nearest emergency department, especially if you are unwell or having trouble passing urine
- 2. Contact the hospital where you had your surgery and ask to speak to the duty nurse manager (available 24 hours a day), or a nurse from the ward you were discharged from
- 3. Contact Swan Urology and ask for an urgent review with Dr Ooi
- 4. Contact your General Practitioner and ask for an urgent review
